Leadership rarely fails because of incompetence

It fails because of overload.

Senior leaders carry responsibility for strategy, growth, transformation, and culture.
What they do not have is unlimited capacity.

Without structural relief, a dangerous bottleneck emerges:
The leader becomes the operational hub.

And this is where inefficiency begins.

Executive assistance as a structural solution

A senior executive assistant is not an administrative addition.

1. Capacity expansion at decision level
